

PROCLAMATION MADE PURSUANT TO SECTION 7 OF THE CEMETERIES ORDINANCE, 1911, VESTING LAND IN TRUSTEES FOR A PUBLIC CEMETERY.

PROCLAMATION.<sup>(1)</sup>

By His Excellency JOHN HUBERT PLUNKETT MURRAY, Lieutenant-Governor of the Territory of Papua.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance (No. 7 of 1912) intituled the *Cemeteries Ordinance*, 1911, it is amongst other things enacted that the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may from time to time appoint, and from time to time remove, any number of persons, not less than three, to be trustees of any Public Cemetery and may, by proclamation and without issuing any deed of grant, vest any lands and hereditaments in such trustees for a Public Cemetery, and may declare the style or title of such trustees: Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, by and with the advice of the Executive Council and in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the said Ordinance, do hereby proclaim and declare that all that piece or parcel of land situate near the villages of Elevara and Tanuabada, Central Division, that is comprised within the boundaries set forth in the Schedule hereto; and which is known as the Port Moresby Public Cemetery, shall be vested in the names of the following gentlemen<sup>(2)</sup> :—

CECIL VINE ALLOM,

JAMES THOMAS O'MALLEY.

And I do furthermore proclaim and declare that my proclamation, bearing date the tenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and

### SCHEDULE.

#### DESCRIPTION OF BOUNDARIES.

Commencing at a point which bears 59 degrees 35 minutes, and distant five hundred and nineteen and four-tenth links from a point which bears 339 degrees 40 minutes, and distant eight thousand five hundred and forty-five links from North-Western corner of Section 111, Town of Granville East, and bounded thence on the South-East by a line bearing 59 degrees 35 minutes for six hundred links; thence on the North-East by a line bearing 329 degrees thirty-five minutes for one hundred and eighty-five links; thence on the North-West by a line bearing 239 degrees 35 minutes for six hundred links, and thence bounded on the South-West by a line bearing 149 degrees 35 minutes for one hundred and eighty-five links to the point of commencement. All bearing true. Native Cemetery not included in the above.

WHEREAS by Proclamation<sup>(2)</sup> dated the second day of March, one thousand nine hundred and ten, made under the provisions of *The Land Ordinance of 1906*, it was *inter alia* proclaimed that All that area of land known as the Rogeia Cemetery, and situated on the Island of Rogeia in the Eastern Division of the said Territory should be reserved from lease as a place for the interment of the dead and certain persons therein mentioned were appointed trustees thereof:

And whereas by the *Cemeteries Ordinance, 1911* (No. 7 of 1912) it is amongst other things enacted that the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may by proclamation published in the *Gazette* declare that any land by proclamation placed under the control of Trustees for the purpose of the interment of the dead under the provisions of *The Land Ordinance of 1906*, is and shall be a public cemetery:

Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, by and with the advice of the Executive Council and in the pursuance of the powers so vested in me by the *Cemeteries Ordinance, 1911*, do hereby proclaim and declare that All that the said area of land known as the Rogeia Cemetery and situated as aforesaid, the boundaries of which are particularly described in the Schedule hereto, is and shall be a public cemetery:

And I furthermore proclaim and declare that the proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred

and fifteen, published in *Gazette* No. 9 of the second day of June, 1915, is hereby revoked.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the said Territory this eighth day of July, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, and in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign.

### SCHEDULE.

#### DESCRIPTION OF BOUNDARIES.

Commencing at a post bearing 198 degrees 47 minutes and distant forty-three and eight-tenths links from a Louka tree marked C.M. on the island of Rogeia; bounded thence on the North by a line bearing 268 degrees 25 minutes for six hundred and seventy and five-tenths links; thence on the West by a line bearing 179 degrees 38 minutes for four hundred and twenty-five and one-tenth links; thence on the South by a line bearing 90 degrees 8 minutes for six hundred and sixty-seven and nine-tenths links; thence on the East by a line bearing 359 degrees 54 minutes for four hundred and forty-five and four-tenths links to the point of commencement. All bearings true.
