*Customs Tariff Act 1990***EXEMPTION FROM IMPORT DUTY**

I, Grand Chief Sir Paulias Matane, G.C.L., G.C.M.G., K.St.J., Governor-General, by virtue of the powers conferred by Section 9(1)(b) of the *Customs Tariff Act 1990*, and all other powers me enabling, acting with, and in accordance with, the advice of the National Executive Council, hereby, exempt from import duty of Tuna Cannery, Fresh Fish Processing Plant and Fish Powder Processing Plant and Export facility in Kokopo, East New Britain Province of the Project Agreement between the Independent State of Papua New Guinea, East New Britain Provincial Government and New Britain Resources Development Limited which are related to the construction and operation of the major impact Development Fishing Project for Papua New Guinea.

**DECLARATION UNDER SECTION 63**

THIS notice is in substitution for the similar notice which appeared in *National Gazette* No. G51 on 2nd April, 2007 in which a small number of the locations listed in Schedules 2, 3 and 4 were misspelt or misdescribed.

THE INDEPENDENT CONSUMER AND COMPETITION COMMISSION (Commission) declares, pursuant to Section 63(1)(c) of the *Telecommunications Act 1996*, that all public mobile licences are subject to the conditions (including the Schedules to those conditions) specified in this declaration.

**Network Coverage and Network Rollout Conditions:**

- Each public mobile licensee (carrier) is required to provide network coverage in each of the towns, villages or localities specified in Schedules 1, 2, 3 and 4 to this condition, by no later than the dates specified for the town, village or area in these conditions and in the respective Schedules, and to continue to provide network coverage in those locations for ten years from the commencement date in its licence, or from 17th October, 2007, whichever is the earlier.

**Declaration under Section 63—continued**

2. *Definitions:*— For the purposes of these conditions:—
- (i) “network coverage” means coverage to a generally accepted commercial standard, being the ability to make and hold, or receive and hold, a mobile phone call from 90% of the locations in the network coverage area for 90% of the time;
  - (ii) “network coverage area” means an area centred upon the town, village or locality specified in Schedules 1, 2, 3 or 4 in which it is generally recognised that at least 75% of the population of that town, village or locality are living; and
  - (iii) it is accepted that coverage may not be possible in a small number of locations within a network coverage area due to terrain limitations (black spots), which locations will not be included when calculating network coverage.
3. *Main Centres:*— Each carrier is required to provide network coverage through its own facilities (with or without the use of another carrier’s mobile or fixed facilities as well) in each town specified in Schedule 1, within fifteen months from the commencement date in its licence or by 30th September, 2008, whichever is the later. If a carrier cannot provide network coverage to the standard required by condition 2 by the date specified in this condition, it will not be in breach of this condition 3 if, by that date, it is providing network coverage in at least 60% of the locations within that town for 90% of the time and if, within a further period of fifteen months, the carrier extends its network coverage to the standard required by condition 2.
4. *Mid-sized Centres:*— Each carrier is required to provide network coverage through its own facilities (with or without the use of another carrier’s mobile or fixed facilities as well) in each town specified in Schedule 2, within two years from the commencement date in its licence or by 30th June, 2009, whichever is the later. If a carrier cannot provide network coverage to the standard required by condition 2 by the date specified in this condition, it will not be in breach of this condition 4 if, by that date, it is providing network coverage through at least one normal power or high power base station within that town for 90% of the time and if, within a further period of two years, the carrier extends its network coverage to the standard required by condition 2, whether by the installation of additional base stations or otherwise.
5. *Administrative District Centres:*— Each carrier is required to provide network coverage, either through its own facilities or in co-operation with another mobile carrier or carriers using those other carriers’ mobile or fixed facilities, in each centre specified in Schedule 3, within three years from the commencement date in its licence or by 30th June, 2010, whichever is the later. If a carrier cannot provide network coverage to the standard required by condition 2 by the date specified in this condition, it will not be in breach of this condition 5 if, by that date, it is providing network coverage through at least one normal power or high power base station within that centre for 90% of the time and if, within a further period of two years, the carrier extends its network coverage to the standard required by condition 2, whether by the installation of additional base stations or otherwise.
6. *Smaller Population Centres:*— Each carrier is required to provide network coverage, either through its own facilities or in co-operation with another mobile carrier or carriers using those other carriers’ mobile or fixed facilities, in each locality specified in Schedule 4, within five years from the commencement date in its licence or by 30th June, 2012, whichever is the later. If a carrier cannot provide network coverage to the standard required by condition 2 by the date specified in this condition, it will not be in breach of this condition 6 if, by that date, it is providing network coverage through at least one base station within that locality for 90% of the time.
7. *Modification to Schedule 4 Localities:*— If a carrier considers it impracticable or inappropriate, for technical or other reasons, to locate a base station facility within or adjacent to any particular locality specified in Schedule 4, it may, with the consent of the Commission (which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld), nominate an alternative location for a facility to service either that locality or another locality within the same province as the locality specified in Schedule 4. The carrier will satisfy the requirements of condition 6 if it provides network coverage to the required standard in that alternative locality and the overall number of localities to which it is required to provide network coverage under condition 6 is not less than the number of localities specified in Schedule 4.

8. *Force Majeure*:— Any failure to provide network coverage due to loss of or damage to facilities arising from cyclone, storm, flood, earthquake, volcanic eruption, tidal wave, landslide or any other natural disaster; or due to an act of public enemy, war (declared or undeclared), sabotage, vandalism, blockade, riot, civil commotion or any violent or threatening actions, shall be disregarded when determining whether a carrier is providing network coverage to the required standard in any particular location, provided that the carrier takes reasonable steps to reinstate or repair the facilities within a reasonable time after the loss or damage occurs. In the event that particular facilities are subjected to repeated sabotage, vandalism or blockade which makes it impossible or unsafe for a carrier to use and maintain those facilities for protracted periods, the carrier may, with the Commission's consent, close down or relocate those facilities, without being in breach of these conditions.
9. *Fair Pricing Principles*:— While carriers may choose to charge differential tariffs for mobile services depending upon the location from which a call is initiated, the maximum permitted tariff for each carrier from any location within Papua New Guinea to any other location within Papua New Guinea shall be no more than fifty percent higher than the equivalent tariff from that carrier for a call made between two locations within Port Moresby. In this respect any tariff which exceeds that permitted differential shall be subject to disapproval by the Commission under Section 78(4) of the *Telecommunications Act* 1996.
10. *Inter-carrier Co-operation*:— Carriers are required to provide access and interconnection to each other's networks and facilities in accordance with the *Telecommunications Act* and the Telecommunications Interconnect Code of Practice. In addition, carriers may choose to satisfy their obligations under conditions 5 and 6 in providing network coverage in the locations specified in Schedules 3 and 4, through co-operative arrangements with other mobile carriers which would not require each mobile carrier to install and maintain its own facilities in all of the locations specified in Schedules 3 and 4. However, in those locations where a carrier did not operate its own facilities, that carrier must ensure that its customers have network access to make or receive calls, either through inter-carrier roaming arrangements or otherwise.
11. *Facilities Sharing and Utilising Another Carrier's Facilities*:— Carriers must inform the Commission of proposals for co-operation in providing network access in locations specified in Schedules 3 and 4 including:—
  - (a) infrastructure sharing in particular locations or cost sharing for installation and operation of facilities;
  - (b) access to another carrier's facilities or premises for installation or co-location of antennae, masts, base stations or other facilities;
  - (c) use of another carrier's facilities in particular locations for access by the first carrier's customers to its network utilising the other carrier's facilities; and
  - (d) any other co-operative arrangements between carriers to allow a carrier's customers network access in all locations in Schedules 3 and 4.
12. *Fairness Principles for Co-operative Arrangements*:— Inter-carrier co-operation arrangements to provide network access are subject to approval by the Commission, which will apply the following principles in deciding whether to approve those arrangements:—
  - (a) *No Anticompetitive Effects*:—Inter-carrier arrangements must promote competition or be at worst competitive neutral;
  - (b) *Consumer Benefit*:—Arrangements must consider the public benefits including the benefits for all customers of the parties to the arrangements.
  - (c) *Fairness and Equity*:—Arrangements must not be unfair to any participating carrier and any access or interconnection charges must be reasonably cost based and in accordance of the requirements in Part XI of the *Telecommunications Act*.
13. *Sharing the Burden Fairly in Providing Network Access in Remote and Low use Locations*:— The Commission recognises that providing network access in some locations in Schedules 3 and 4 may be costly for carriers and in some cases may not be profitable, even in the longer term. To minimise this cost, carriers may choose to agree among themselves, in accordance with condition 11, on reciprocal arrangements whereby one carrier only will install and operate facilities in nominated locations, with customers of the other carriers having network access through that first carrier's facilities, which in other locations, other carriers will install and operate facilities which similarly give network access to the other carriers' customers. *The overriding principle in any such arrangements will be that the financial burden of installing, maintaining and operating mobile networks in more remote locations where customer usage may not be high enough to otherwise be commercially justifiable, will be shared equally among all mobile licensees who participate in those arrangements and will not financially disadvantage any one licensee.* To this end, the Commission will approve such inter-carrier reciprocal arrangements on the principles that:—

- (a) Each of the participating licensed mobile carriers would install and operate approximately the same number of facilities as the other party or parties to the arrangement and there would be a fair geographic spread of the facilities installed and operated by each carrier, taking into account the varying costs in each location so that the capital and running costs for each carrier can be approximately equalised.
- (b) The benefits of being the sole facility operator in particular locations will be shared equally among all participating operators.
- (c) The ratio of solo sites to be operated by each carrier in Schedule 3 localities to Schedule 4 localities shall be approximately the same for all carriers involved in those arrangements.

The Commission would consider approving alternative commercial arrangements for providing network coverage in all Schedules 3 and 4 locations which did not comply with all of principles a, b and c in this condition 13, but only where all of the participating licensed mobile carriers asked the Commission to approve the arrangement; where the overriding principle of equal sharing of the burden applied; and where the interests of customers or potential customers in those locations were protected and promoted.

14. *Review of Commission Decisions:*— A licensed mobile carrier may apply to the Appeals Panel for review of a decision made by the Commission under condition 13 as if that decision were a decision to which Section 182A of the *Telecommunications Act* applies and the procedures set out in that Section 182A shall apply to any such application for review.
15. *Date of Commencement:*— These conditions shall take effect from the commencement date of the third mobile licence to be issued, or on 17th October, 2007, whichever occurs earlier.
