Correctional hearing, 3rd September, 1912

Public Prosecutor against Willie of Owrea and Mousse (Owrea) accused of
breach of Article 59.

The year 1912, 3rd September, at 9 a.m., the joint court composed of members The
President; the French judge; the British judge; in the presence of the Public
Prosecutor; Mr Beugel, Registrar recording;
sitting in police jurisdiction, in public hearing, in first and last resort, delivered the
following judgment:

1. As regards Mousse;

Considering that it is not established that Mousse was properly and duly summoned,
that in consequence it is necessary for the moment to put Mousse out of the case.

2. As regards Willie;

Considering that he has been summoned in due form and Willie does not appear
nor anyone on his behalf; that it is necessary in consequence to pronounce
default against the offender for failure to appear;

The case..

Having heard read the documents in the case; no one for the offender; the Public
Prosecutor in his conclusions;

Considering that from the debates, the confession of the offender included in the
several reports produced and read during the investigation, sufficient proof is
established that, in January 1911, the person named Willie did, at a place
called Scanakel, island of Tanna, New Hebrides, give and sell alcoholic
liquors to New Hebridean natives; offence provided for and punished by Articles
59 and 61 of the Convention of 20th October 1906, as follows:

59: "... no person shall, in the New Hebrides, including the Banks and Tonga Islands
and within the territorial waters of the former sell or supply intoxicating liquors
to the natives in any form and on any pretext whatsoever."

61: "Any breach by non-natives of Articles 57, 59... shall be punishable by a fine
of from £10 to £20."

For these reasons:

Places, for the moment, Mousse out of the case; pronounces default against Willie
for non-appearance; condemns by default, Willie to pay a fine of twenty-five francs (25)
and all costs.

This decree, judged and pronounced the day mentioned above in public hearing and
last resort and signed by Count de Bressieux as President; Jean Colonna, French judge; John
Alexander, British judge; Beugel, Registrar.
