Buenos Aires, 13 September 1912

Between Mr. Facon, acting for Count of Coromana, plaintiff; and... Mr. Silvain Salvin, planter. Taree, defendant;

The year 1912, 13 September, at 10 a.m., the joint board composed of
Messrs. the President, Mr. Alexander, the British judge,
Jean Colonna; the French judge, Mr. Benga, Registrar, etc.,
sitting in civil jurisdiction, in public hearing, first and last resort, delivered
the following judgment:

Considering that by will of 28th August, 1912, Mr. Facon, acting for Joseph
Alas Count of Coromana (newly) summoned Mr. Salvin before
the joint board for restitution of two bamboo tubes to the above-named;

Considering that Mr. Salvin deposited the bamboos in question on the table
of the joint board, that he placed them at the disposal of the plaintiff;

Considering nevertheless, that in course of the debates, Mr. Salvin stated and
maintained that on the allegation of a certain number of natives, these bamboos
contained poisonous substances, of which nearly, when on his property, made use
to send to sleep his indigenous labour, notably, a native woman, whom he had
carried off to the bush after administering a portion of the substance mentioned;

That in presence of a statement of that nature the Public Prosecutor,
to whose speech was given, replied that he had no remarks to make, nor
request;

For these reasons:

The board notes the reply in the negative to the Public Prosecutor of the joint
board; gives in sight a certificate to Mr. Salvin of his having restored
to Mr. Facon, as counsel, these bamboos in question to the plaintiff; condemns
Mr. Salvin to pay all costs.
