

Public Prosecutor against Jean Louis Chatot, blacksmith, Vila, accused of a breach of article 59 of the law of 20 October, 1906...

The year 1913, 1st October, at 9 am. the joint court composed of Messrs the President, Count de Buena Esperanza; the French judge, Jean Boloma; the British judge, Silchrist Alexander; In the presence of the Public Prosecutor, Count d'Andries; Mr. Deval, Registrar, recording; sitting in Civil jurisdiction, public hearing, first and last resort, delivered the following judgment:

The joint court:

Having heard the documents in the case read, the denials of the offender; Considering that from the hearing under oath of the witness Kiki and the report drawn up by the colonial Police Officer relative to the statement of the former no certain proof has been adduced that Chatot did on the 14th September, 1912, at Vila sell a bottle of wine to the above-named native;

For these reasons:

Dismisses Chatot from the case without costs and charges the expenses of the case to the Government Treasury.
