Correctional sitting 15th October, 1912.

(No 105.)

In the Prosecutor against Nam Van Guen, bushmeat employee of Mr. Baker, Vila, accused of breach of Article 61 of the Convention.

The year 1912, 15th October, at 9 am. The Court composed of the President, Count Geneva Imperial; the French Judge, Jean Bolomey; the British Judge, T. Roebel; in the presence of the Public Prosecutor, Count d'Anduze; M. Neugel, Registrar, recording sitting in police jurisdiction, in public hearing, first and last resort, delivered the following judgment:

The Court finds:

Nam heard the documents in the case read; the offender in his explanations; Nam heard the Public Prosecutor in his requisition, the offender in his means of defense; Considering that from the depositions and the hearing of several witnesses it is established that Nam Van Guen did on the 28th and 29th September, 1912, at Vila, sell to New Zealand natives two bottles of rum for the sum of five francs per bottle;

Offense provided for and punished by articles 59 and 61 of the Convention, as follows:
59 "... no person shall in the New Hebrides..... sell or supply intoxicating liquors to the natives in any form and on any pretext whatsoever....."
61 "Any breach by non-natives of articles... 59, shall be punishable by a fine of from F-10 to F-20...."

For other reasons:

Consideration Nam Van Guen to pay a fine of twenty-five francs (F-25) and all costs of the trial.

So done, judged and pronounced the day, month and year as above. By the Court itself, the President, the French and British judges who have signed with the Registrar.
