

No 121 Joint Court of the New Hebrides
Criminal sitting of December 10th 1912

The Public Prosecutor versus Henri Guillouean, Malo, accused
of a breach of Article 59 of the Convention of 1906.

This tenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and
twelve at 9 o'clock A.M. The Joint Court consisting of
The President, Count Buena Esperanza; the French Judge,
Jean Colonna; the British Judge, T.E. Rosby;

In the presence of the Public Prosecutor, Count Andino;
M. Bengel being Registrar of the Court;
Sitting as a Court of police jurisdiction, in public
audience, of first and last instance, has delivered the
following judgment:

The Joint Court:

Having heard the reading of the documents of the case;
M. Nicholas, colonist of Malo, and other ad hoc in his
explanations; nothing for the accused;
Having heard the Public Prosecutor in his charge:

Whereas, by writ, dated September 9th 1912 the said
Guillouean has been summoned before the Court on or
December 9th 1912, to hear himself condemned to the penalties
provided by Articles 59 and 61 of the Convention of
October 20th 1906

Whereas on the case being called, the accused appeared
neither in person nor by proxy; and whereas the
Public Prosecutor asks for judgment by default against
Guillouean for non-appearance;

Whereas, however, being summoned for the 9th instant
the accused could well, and as was his right, ^{have} appeared
at this date without finding open the doors of the
Court before which he was summoned to appear;

Whereas if, on to-day's date, the 10th instant the accused
has not appeared, the Court ^{can} not make a complaint
against him, nor, in consequence, pronounce judgment by
default against him for non-appearance;
