THE FRUIT EXPORT ORDINANCE, 1931.

WESTERN SAMOA.

No. 4, 1931.

### AN ORDINANCE

made by the Administrator of the Territory of Western Samoa with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of that Territory, and in pursuance of the Samoa Act, 1921.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Fruit Export Short title. Ordinance, 1931" and shall come into force on the first day

of April, 1931. 2. In this Ordinance except where a contrary intention Interpretaappears tion.

"Administrator" means the Administrator of Western Samoa:

"Bill of lading" includes any receipt given in lieu thereof by the master, mate, owner or agent of any vessel;

"Case" means a case constructed of material approved by the Inspecting Officer not exceeding in thickness one inch at each end and one half inch elsewhere and

(a) in respect of bananes having an outside measurement of thirty-six inches in length by ten inches in breadth by twolve inches in depth or such other outside measurements as may be substituted therefor by the Administrator by proclamation published in the Gazette;

(b) in respect of other fruit having such outside measurements as may be prescribed by the Administrator by proclamation published in the Gazette.

"Fruit" means bananas and pincapples and such other species of fruit as the Administrator (acting under the powers vested in him by this Ordinance) shall declare to be fruit;

"Gazetto" means "Tho Wostern Se os Gazetto";
"Inducting Officer" means the person duly appointed
by law to discharge the functions assigned to
the inspecting officer under the provisions of
this Ordinanc.

PART I. Licenses.

3. (1) No person shall commond or carry on as principal or agent the trade or business of a fruit exporter except in pursuance of a license issued under this Ordinance.

Fruit exporters to be licensed.

(2) Any person who acts in broach of any of the provisions of this section commits an offence and shall be liable to a fine of one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for six months in respect of each offence.

Interpretation of fruit exporter.

4. (1) Every person shall be deemed to carry on the

business of a fruit exporter who
(a) exports fruit from Saloa;

(b) buys fruit for the purpose of exporting

it from Sa ca;
(c) buys fr it for the purpose of selling or otherwise disposing of it for export from

Sa ca; (d) receives fr it for the purpose of export-

ing it from Samoa;

(e) receives fruit for the purpose of selling or disposing of it for export from Sa oa.

(2) The provisions of this section shall not apply to the New Zealand Reperation Estates or to any person

(a) while acting as agent or servent for a

licensed fruit exporter;
(b) while acting as corner carrier for a

licensed fruit exporter;

(c) we is exempted under the provisions of section twelve hereof.

6. The At indistrator may from time to time by Proclamation published in the Gazetts excets fruit buying districts and may from time to time fix the minimum prices to be paid by fruit experters for fruit grown by Sameans

in each or any district.

Saloan Shall pay for the same in cash at the time of taking or to pay

delivery.
(2) Every fruit experter shall keep a record book in the form set out in the First Schooule hereto and shall correctly enter therein in respect of all fruit purchased for export (whether fre a Sa can or a European)

(a) The names and addresses of the persons from whom the fruit exporter purchased

or acquired such fruit; (b) The nu ber of cases and bunches of each species of fruit purchased or acquired from each person and the prices paid therefor respectively;

(c) The dates on which the fruit exporter took delivery of such fruit.

(3) All entries required to be made under the last preceding subsection shall be made immediately delivery has been taken of the fruit purchased for export.

(4) Every fruit exporter shall upon demand produce his record book for inspection by the Inspecting Officer or

any person acting under his authority.

(5) Any person who acts in breach of any of the provisions of this section commits an offence and shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds for each offence.

(a) The name of the ship in which such fruit

was exported:

(b) The date of the export thereof;

(c) The total number of cases and bunches of each species of fruit exported.

(2) Every fruit exporter was fails to deliver the statement referred to and within the time specified in the last preceding subsection or who delivers a statement which is false or misleading in any particular commits an offence and is liable to a fine of fifty pounds.

9. (1) The Addinistrator may from time to time by

(b) restrict the exportation of fruit which has been or may be grown by any person other than a Sa can to such quantities and species and for such time as he shall think fit.

(2) Any person who exports or attempts to export any fruit in breach of any of the provisions of any proclamation made under this section commits an offence and shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred pounds.

### PART II. (Inspection).

10. (1) No person shall expert fruit from Samoa un- Ne omper taloss and until the same has been inspected and passed for tion before export by an officer (heroinafter called the Inspecting inspection. Officer ) ouly appointed in that behalf.

(2) No porson shall issue a bill of lading in respect of fruit to be exported from Sa oa unless the person applying therefor shall have first produced a certificate under the hand of the Inspecting Officer that the fruit has been inspected and passed by him for export.

(3) Any person who acts in breach of any of the provisions of this section commits an offence and shall be

liable to a penalty of fifty pounds.

11. (1) The Inspecting Officer shall not pass any fruit for export until the inspection fee in respect there- as to Inof at the rate hereinafter prescribed has been paid nor shall he pass for export any fruit which

(c) is improperly packed;

(d) is backed in any receptacle other than a case as defined in section two of this Ordinance.

There shall be payable by the exporter the sum of three pence per case and three half pence per bunch of fruit inspected by the Inspecting Officer.

### PART III. (General)

12. (1) The Inspecting Officer may by writing under his hand exempt from the provisions of this Ordinance any person who desires to export not more than ten cases of fruit in any one shipment and who satisfies him that the proposed exportation is for private purposes and not by way of business.

Exemption in resuct of small quantities.

(2) An exemption ranted by the Inspecting Officer under this section shall not apply to more than one shipment.

13. (1) The Administrator may by proclamation pubthe Gazette declare that any species of fruit shall be fruit within the meaning of this Ordinance. (2) Any such proclamation may be varied or revoked

(c) proscribing the fees to be paid upon the issue of a fruit buying depot license.

(a) fixing standards or grades of quality of fruit to be experted and prohibiting the expert of fruit which does not comply with a prescribed standard or grade.

(e) regulating the packing of fruit and the marking of cases to describe the class of quality or grade of the fruit contained therein,

(f) regulating and prescribing all matters which in his opinion are necessary for the promotion of the fruit export industry or the protection of growers of fruit for export or any class of such growers.

15. The fifty-first section of "The Revenue Ordinance, Repeal. 1929" is horeby repealed.
